Emmaus communities offer a home for as long as someone needs it. Companions get a room of their own, food, clothing and a small weekly allowance. Life in the community can offer the companionship and support that many people who have experienced homelessness have lost - helping them start to regain a sense of control and stability in their lives.

“I arrived at Emmaus just before Christmas, on Christmas Eve in fact. My first day was pretty scary. It didn't take long till I knew everyone though. The thing about everyone at Emmaus is they make you feel really comfortable so I settled in really quickly. I don't know where I would be without Emmaus.” Robbo

The 2nd hand superstore at Emmaus Brighton is packed with second-hand furniture, bric-a-brac, clothing, books, records, CDs, DVDs & haberdashery with new stock being added daily. It's a veritable treasure trove for local bargain hunters.

Emmaus provides a unique and innovative solution to homelessness. The Community offers companionship and a place to live and work, with each individual contributing by working to the best of their ability. At Emmaus Brighton, companions’ jobs can range from working in one of our social enterprises, to working on the home team – keeping the place clean and tidy for everyone else.

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“It was very soon after my husband had died that my grandson and his wife visited Emmaus for the first time. Bruno and I had just celebrated our 60th wedding anniversary and he had died a few days later. They picked up a leaflet that said that there would be a meeting for people who would like to volunteer and told me “Granny, it’s just what you need”.

The funeral was a few days away and at that first meeting and during that time, the new friends I made at Emmaus were a tremendous support. Coming to Emmaus pulled me through, kept me busy and made sure I carried on thinking about other things.” Denise

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Emmaus is an international solidarity movement motivated by the simple sentence: 'serve first those who suffer most'. Established in 1971, Emmaus International is now made up of more than 300 communities, in 36 countries, across Africa, Asia, Europe and the Americas.

Staff, companions and trustees from Emmaus Brighton regularly visit projects in other parts of the world and receive visitors from many different countries. Beatrice visited us in 2015 from her home in an Emmaus community near Milan, Italy to support our Greenhouse project by growing plants in our polytunnel.

We take our responsibility towards the environment very seriously and although first and foremost we are a reuse organisation, we endeavour to recycle as much as possible. We sort donations as they come in, checking that items are of suitable quality to be resold. Anything else is sent to rag, which is an additional way of receiving vital funds to keep us going. Last year Emmaus Brighton saved over 15 tonnes of clothes from landfill, helping raise over £6,500 for our community.
